A WORD FROM THE PROJECT LEAD



Dear Friends and Colleagues,

Recent developments highlight pressing challenges that continue to shape the future of global health. The withdrawal of the United States from the World Health Organisation and the withholding of funding for critical global health projects have raised serious questions about the feasibility of solidarity in global health. Is it an achievable goal, or merely an aspirational ideal detached from practice? The core motivation to ensure health equity for all in global health is at stake.

Our research, however, offers hope and a way forward. Rather than looking for answers from those who, up to now, have charted the global health agenda, we should learn from communities and individuals who have long thrived in resource-constrained environments. From the Himalayan region to Central America, the Pacific Islands, Igboland in Nigeria, and rural women in Southern Africa—we have learned that solidarity, when understood and practiced authentically, is a powerful driver of change.

These communities remind us that when we come together, our collective power far exceeds the sum of our individual capacities. Like the West African broom (igbale in Yoruba), made of fragile straws but strong enough to sweep away what is unwanted, we too can achieve transformative change. This newsletter shares some of the lessons we have learned—and unlearned—from inspiring community leaders, activists, and scholars. We hope their stories inspire you as much as they have inspired us.


